

Nosy Neighbours:

Yard Privacy

Maybe you are friendly with your neighbour, or maybe you find them a little on the nosy side and could use a little privacy. If that's the case, there are many options available to choose from.

The most obvious solution might be a fence, but if you don't want to create possible tension or future issues that may arise if you erect a boundary fence, consider a softer approach, such as a **hedge**. Look into different types of shrubs or trees to plant. Important factors are how tall they will grow and how long it will take to grow to create a hedge at the height you want.

If a fence or hedge isn't something you want to tackle right now, or it's not what you want or need, focus on creating a smaller enclosure for privacy with **screening** (e.g., bamboo, partition, sun shade, or curtain panels) on a porch or by installing panels on a pergola.

Another way to get some privacy is through **vertical gardening** – think trees, shrubs, ornamental grasses, and fast-growing vines (e.g., on a trellis).

There are many other yard privacy ideas available to be found online. Whatever you decide, your privacy efforts will benefit your comfort in the short-term and make it more desirable to buyers long-term.

Ditch the Lawn Mower:

Alternatives to Grass Cutting

At this point in the summer, if you have a lawn to cut, you may be a little weary of grass cutting. Take the worry and work out of your lawn by considering alternatives to natural grass, that are not only less work but have other benefits as well.

 just some options. To add dimension and texture choose
 a few.
- Gravel You can also add rocks of varying sizes strategically placed within the gravel for a modern look. If you want some accent colour try adding some neighbouring plants, shrubs, and trees. Other benefits of gravel are that it helps to keep the weeds down and requires no water.
