## Streamlining Your Garden Work

Do you sometimes find that watering plants can end up being more of a chore than anything else? If the answer is "yes," then you may be interested in automatic watering systems.

One option is a **drip irrigation system**, available in several varieties for both in-ground and container gardens. Drip irrigation systems release the right amount of water directly into the soil through tubing with emitters, connected to a water source and controlled by an automated timer for a slow, steady flow.

**Wicking systems** are another option for containers that draw water up from a built-in reservoir at the bottom of a container.

For a simple DIY option, you can use an **upturned plastic bottle** placed near the roots of a plant. Make small holes in the cap with a nail and hammer for the slow release of water and cut off the bottom of the bottle so you can refill it.

Automated watering systems can offer peace of mind when you are away. However, it's important to keep in mind that some systems require an initial installation cost and frequent maintenance to ensure they continue to run smoothly.

If you are considering an automated irrigation system, first research whether your municipality has any **irrigation restrictions**.
