Traditional wallpaper is generally considered the more durable and long-lasting option with a typical lifespan of 10 to 15 years. Installation is more complex and usually requires specific materials, so you may want to consider hiring a professional. It offers a broader selection of colours, textures, and patterns than peel-and-stick, and is more durable against moisture, so it's less likely to trap humidity or harbour mould behind it, making it more suitable for kitchens, bathrooms, and laundry rooms. However, traditional wallpaper can be a deal-breaker if potential homebuyers don't like it, given how labour-intensive it can be to remove.
